Year in Review of Kevin Coleman Mental Health Center from the 1991 Annual Report

- ✓ Every month in 1991 an average of 67 new individuals requested services at the Center.
- ✓ Three mental health levies failed in the past fifteen months, and this resulted in a loss of revenue totaling over \$365,000.
- ✓ Center was forced to reduce some services but maintained to foster an atmosphere of hope and optimism to cope with mental illness.

Services and Programs Update

Counseling:

Over 1,000 people received help through the Counseling Department in 1991 – and increase of over 9 percent.

Vocational Rehabilitation:

Each year, over 70 people with disabilities are placed in community jobs with support from staff training consultants. The Center is now participating in a new consortium of job development representatives which will coordinate placement for persons with disabilities throughout the county. The consortium includes Kent State University, Maplewood Joint Vocational School and the Portage County Board of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities as well as other organizations. The community job placement consortium will operate out of the Kevin Coleman Center's employment services.

Crisis Residential Services:

The number of persons served in the unit more than doubled this year – from 169 to 343.

Crisis Intervention Services:

During the past year, the Center's crisis intervention staff responded to over 10,760 requests for help – an increase of 28 percent over the previous year.

Case Management:

Case management services saw a dramatic increase in the number of persons served – a rise of nearly 38 percent to 476 individuals. The quality of the Center's program was reflected in a state-wide award given to Elaine Walker in 1991 for excellence in case management. Elaine was also featured on a Cleveland TV news program.

Residential Treatment Services:

Community Living Services:

In 1991, the Center's community living program provided day treatment services for 174 individuals to encourage, teach

and support independent living.

Psychiatric Services:

This year 679 persons received assistance from Psychiatric Services.

Community Apartments:

Because the Center has purchased and rehabilitated additional housing units this year, the number of persons with mental illness finding housing increased by 50 percent. The Center was awarded a McKinney Housing Grant to purchase, renovate and operate 10 additional apartment units. The \$636,923 from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development and the \$152,075 in State monies will also provide case management and vocational services for persons placed in the apartments. Kevin Coleman now owns and operates 27 apartments for persons who are homeless mentally ill.

Services for Business:

This year the Foundation raised \$13,600 at the third annual “RIGHT AT HOME” benefit. The benefit and annual drive enabled the Foundation to award grants totaling over \$2,500 to the Kevin Coleman Center and the Portage County Board of Mental Health.
