### **COLEMAN PROFESSIONAL SERVICES HAS A NAME TO BE PROUD OF**

KENT, Ohio (July, 2007) – The true foundation of Coleman Professional Services was built upon the values and practices of Father Kevin Coleman, a priest, mentor and friend. Fr. Coleman touched many lives in our local community during his own lifetime. Although his life on Earth was cut short in 1973 at the age of 42 from complications with internal hemorrhaging, Fr. Coleman’s lasting legacy and spirit of generosity and reaching out to anyone and everyone is alive more than ever through the mental and behavioral health services of Coleman Professional.

Fr. Coleman wore many hats in his lifetime in many diverse capacities. During his career, he worked closely with the U.S. Air Force and numerous private and public hospitals throughout country as a consultant and instructor. He was a research pioneer in the field of death and dying, in which his work was nationally recognized. He also served full-time on the group resources staff in crisis intervention. He worked at the Metropolitan General Hospital in Cleveland, Ohio to develop a program for physicians and nurses that would help hospitalized children and their families deal more effectively with the anxiety and fear accompanying hospitalization and surgery.

According to friend and co-worker, Jean Phillips, “Many people were unaware Kevin was also a Catholic priest at St. Patrick’s Parish in Kent, Ohio.” Ordained a priest in 1958 in

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Youngstown, Fr. Coleman came to St. Patrick's in 1966, and his interest in mental health was then sparked by both family background and religious training. His family instilled in him a deep faith in God and a belief that his best "job" in life was to be of service to others. He was also instrumental in working to turn the former St. Patrick's convent over for use for mental health services.

Serving as a teacher and counselor for both students and adults in the Kent State University Group Resources & Counseling Center, Fr. Coleman was able to touch many lives of his peers and colleagues by his outgoing, humorous and humanitarian personality. Co-worker and friend, Dr. Sue Hetrick said Fr. Coleman was a great mentor to her. "Kevin had a very healthy and fun attitude. He taught me how important it is to live a full life and give to others. People were always drawn to his charismatic personality, and he was always willing to offer free counseling services. I think today he would be amazed at the services offered in the community and the availability of services to the general public," Hetrick said. Co-worker, Dr. Dick Rynearson agreed and explained how he was able to learn from Fr. Coleman, who served as a role model to him as a young professional. "Kevin was very good at handling crises. Though he often met with very difficult patients, he was very skilled in working with them. He talked many students out of suicide. I didn't know anyone who didn't like or respect him."

In 1970, Fr. Coleman worked and studied as a doctoral graduate student in Counseling Psychology in the School of Education at Kent State where he unexpectedly died three years later and was awarded his Ph.D. posthumously. Dr. Arvin Lubetkin, Fr. Coleman's supervisor in the counseling services said Fr. Coleman's selflessness was exhibited during his time of illness. "Even through Kevin's time of pain and illness, he always kept the focus on helping others.

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He never let his own suffering get in the way of his services to the community. He kept his pain inside,” Lubetkin said”

In 1978, The Kevin Coleman Mental Health Center was named in his honor to remember all he accomplished. This center was established by community leaders who saw the need for expanded and centralized mental health services in Portage County. It was also founded to provide community-based services for local citizens who were being discharged in large numbers from the state psychiatric hospitals. Dr. Sue Hetrick explained how the agency was initially constructed. “There was a contract dispute with the current mental health agency and a mad scrambling for local agencies to consolidate there services, which was called for by the board. Key people in the area came together and set up what is today renamed since 1996, Coleman Professional Services, “Hetrick said.

Fr. Coleman will be most remembered by his friends and family as a Man of God, who would have helped anyone and laughed and loved life. Philips said, “Coleman embodies his qualities, goals and attitudes toward people.” Friend of Fr. Coelman and Board Member of the Coleman Foundation, Tammy Rynearson, said, “Kevin did not discriminate against anyone, and there were no barriers between him and the public. Coleman Professional Services exists today as a magnification of what Kevin would have done in his lifetime.” Dennis Missimi, who often entertained Fr. Coleman and others at his family’s home, agreed. “Though Kevin would have probably been slightly discomforted by the recognition, he would be proud Coleman Professional Services is serving others the way he would have served them, specifically seeing each person as an individual first and part of a community second. A lot of people are around today who wouldn’t be if he wasn’t there for them.”
